Both these productions were highly acclaimed by the SCDF adjudicator, Louise Manders and we wish the teams all the very the best of luck on the  $22^{nd}$ .






## Betty Jeal. A lovely lady taken from us very suddenly.

Husband Don was a scenery builder and very active Barn Director giving his time away from the family firm of builders to remodelling and maintaining the Barn. A lasting tribute to Don remains in the form of the sound box, a cosy place seemingly suspended in fresh air in the auditorium. Thank you Betty and Don for your huge contribution to life at the Barn.

Joyce Newitt, A lady dedicated to the art and passion of theatre at the Barn, has died.

Mum's involvement with the Barn Theatre goes back to the mid 1960's when she played many lead roles in pantomimes, plays and the Betchworth Festival with the then Student Players. Back then, as ever, her whole life revolved around theatre. She attended workshops with notable directors such as Alan Ayckbourn and was over the moon when she found out that she had gained her LAMDA Licentiate (hons).



Joyce was on the committee of the Student Players as well as Membership Secretary of the original Friends of the Barn and later went on to join the Oxted Operatic where the whole family gradually joined her on stage or behind the scenes. We remember the countless hours she would help us put a costume together and instilled in us the importance of the right hairdo and accessory!

Mum was a great one for ad-libbing and I remember her telling us a couple of instances;

She was in a costume drama with a box set and when exiting found that the door was well and truly stuck, instead of looking lost she immediately made a grand exit through the fireplace, and on another occasion she had to shoot someone in a play and as I'm sure has happened to a few of you, the gun didn't go off, so Mum threw the gun at her fellow actor who after much crying, moaning and clutching of his head eventually died!

Mum started her directing debut with a selection of mystery plays for the Oxted Carnival and went on to direct some fabulous plays and musicals. She was an avid Barn supporter and always proud of the work created there, she gave her full commitment to any project she was involved with and expected the same from others. Her sometimes stern demeanor at rehearsals came, not from a place of arrogance, but from total and utter passion.



When ill health came upon her, the hardest part was giving up her involvement in community theatre but she continued to support both myself and Fran in our many theatrical endeavours and even this last Christmas directed, edited, made a mini theatre, made tiny figures for, and forced the family to perform her version of A Midsummer Night's Dream followed by a quiz - (Paul won of course)!

Her most notable shows as a performer and director include Man of La Mancha, Oliver, Stepping Out, Mrs Crummles in Nicholas Nickleby, Mama Morton in Chicago and the title role of Jean Brodie in The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie, (which can be seen as part of the mural in the bar - of which she was very proud).

Mum's passion, knowledge and experience has shaped our lives for the better and I hope yours a little too. Cat and Fran
