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# When you think of Jack the Ripper the first thing that comes to mind is not a hilarious cockney knees-up – but that's exactly what *Jack the Ripper – a musical comedy* is!

Written for London's Player's Theatre in 1974 and nominated for Best Musical in the Evening Standard Theatre Awards of the same year, *Jack the Ripper – a musical comedy* is loosely based on the East End murders of 1888 as retold through the company of a Whitechapel Music Hall. With bawdy company numbers that could come straight out of *Oliver!* alongside moments of poignancy evocative of *Les Miserables*, this fun, upbeat, tongue in cheek celebration of Victoriana is a ripping romp for all the family - and definitely not doom and gloom!

The Daily Express called it "a lively musical, exhilarating, melodious, delightfully comic." Whilst the Daily Mirror referred to it as a "very amusing bawdy knees up. Verve and wit and above all a good musical score." The Evening News said "I so like this show. It has so much authentic London flavour." But I think The Sun said it best. 

## In the early 1990's, Q Magazine questioned if R.E.M. could possibly be the best band on the planet at that time?

Nearly thirty years after the release of their landmark REM album "Automatic For The People" in 1992, REMbrandt explore every era of the band's eventual 31 year, 15 album career, which racked up over 85 million record sales.



REMbrandt were formed in 2014 from a seemingly imperfect circle of acquaintances and friends from the Southampton music scene. ## Our Friends at St Mary's and the Barn

The restrictions which came about during the pandemic resulted in 43 productions at the Barn Theatre being cancelled or rescheduled multiple times. Each one has been a disappointment to the theatre, and to the visiting companies we enjoy hosting. One of the organisations we have particularly missed working with is our local primary school, St. Mary's. St. Mary's have been a regular visitor to the theatre for many years and, since 2016, have produced an annual show to raise necessary funds for both the school and the

Financially, so many organisations have missed out on their usual fundraising opportunities due to COVID-19. St. Mary's school is no exception.

Each year, the talented students of St. Mary's (as well as the school's very talented staff) have wowed their audiences with music, song, dance, drama, and poetry. Through such performances, the school has raised over £15,000 to support a multitude of projects. These include the maintenance of St. Mary's all-weather pitch, the addition of mirrors to the dance studio, a collection of Chromebooks that were loaned to students during lockdown, and the purchase of two electric pianos and a drum kit. Alongside raising funds for their own projects, St. Mary's have donated an electric piano to the theatre which we are very pleased with.

We are delighted to welcome St. Mary's back to the stage on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> February 2022. They will be performing twice, once at 2.30pm and again at 7.30pm .Tickets will be available for sale at £15 each from 9am on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> January www.barntheatreoxted.co.uk Funds from this show will go towards the new school swimming pool.

We feel so lucky to have such a positive relationship with the teachers and helpers who are utterly dedicated to making every performance a success. It is a privilege to witness the excitement of every child as they take part in the production, and we cannot wait to provide them this opportunity once more. The Barn is an enormous asset for our community and it is a privilege to to be part of the team. The sound of an audience having a great time and the pride on the faces of the performers coming off stage is what the Barn Theatre was created for and long may it continue. As a Trustee of the newly formed Aquarian Opera I am looking forward to our first show here in the Barn, later in November too.



Those of you who regularly help with providing front of house assistance at the Barn will be aware that Karen Jackson has recently stepped down from the thankless task of co-ordinating our rotas. We are so grateful to her for the countless hours she has spent on this in recent years, and we are

delighted that she has agreed to carry on as a volunteer — so you will still see her behind the bar, but without her infamous black folder! I am also delighted to announce that Nikki Boorman has kindly agreed to take over the reins from Karen, and I am sure you will join me in wishing Nikki the best of luck in her new role.

Back in the summer the Trustees relaxed the "no drinks in the auditorium" rule in order to comply with the COVID guidelines which stipulated that drinks bought at the bar must be consumed when seated in the auditorium (i.e. when socially distanced). Now that restrictions have been lifted, the Trustees have agreed to continue to allow drinks to be consumed whilst watching a performance, and we have recently purchased a range of shatterproof, polycarbonate glasses which may be taken into the auditorium. These can be washed and re-used time and time again, and are a far more environmentally-friendly solution than the disposable plastic cups we were using over the summer. The new wine glasses are slightly larger than the old, allowing us to give customers the option of a large wine (250ml) in addition to the existing standard (175ml) and small (125ml) sizes.

Since the allowing of drinks in the auditorium we have noticed a significant trend in many audience members arriving with insufficient time in which to purchase their drinks before the start of the performance, and this has led on several occasions to lengthy queues at the bar. This was demonstrated most recently on the last night of *And Then There Were None* when our volunteer bar staff served 22 people between 6.50pm and 7.20pm, and a further 29 people in the last ten minutes before the start of the play at 7.30pm! Whilst we are delighted that so many people are keen to use our bar, we would be extremely grateful if audience members wishing to buy a drink before the show (or order one for the interval) could arrive a little earlier in order to prevent a last-minute rush.

Contactless card payments at the Barn via Square are becoming increasingly popular. Since the theatre reopened in June, 78% of all payments received were by debit or credit card, as opposed to just 22% by cash. We would really like card payments to increase even further so, when paying at the box office or the bar, do please use a card if at all possible. One downside to fewer people carrying cash, however, is that there is less loose change to put into our red buckets. In the past this has been a highly successful way of raising funds for projects such as Barn 2000, BarnCool and DRIP (Dressing Room Improvement Project). In fact, in recent years, donations in the buckets as audiences leave the theatre have exceeded £60,000! We are currently looking at the best ways of enabling people to donate by card to our next project, Barn100, but if you wish to make a donation when next at the theatre this can be done with your credit or debit card, via Square, either at the bar or the box office.
